

Grace and peace to you in the name of God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. I am one of those people who like trivia and puzzles and those guizzes that test your knowledge that pop up in magazine articles every so often. Maybe it is because I think they exercise my mind. So, I am starting this letter with one such quiz. The answers are upside down in the box below.

- 1) What is an astronaut?
- 2) What is a prestidigitator?
- 3) What is a conchologist?
- 4) What is a deltiologist?
- 5) What is an artist?
- 6) What is a funambulist?
- 7) What is a librocubicularist?
- 8) What is a phrenologist?

- 10) What is a Christian?

How did you do on this quiz? Actually, I am most interested in how you did on question 10. The temptation, I think, is to go for the quick answer: "one who believes in Christ Jesus." But, really, what is it "to believe" in Christ? Is it just a mental exercise or does it entail something more? Is our Christian faith kind of like fire insurance—we check a box, maybe pay a little fee, then whip it out when catastrophe strikes? Or, is it something that is actually reflected in how we live our lives?

As I look through the definitions for questions 1-9 above, it strikes me that: an astronaut doesn't just believe in space travel, she trains for it; a prestidigitator doesn't just believe in magic or the art of illusion, he *trains for* and *performs* it; a conchologist doesn't just believe in mollusks and shells, she *studies* them to learn everything she can about them; a deltiologist doesn't just believe in postcards, he *makes an investment* and *collects* them; an artist doesn't just believe in art, she *creates* it; a funambulist doesn't just believe that tightrope walking is possible, he *risks, gets out* and walks on the tightrope; and so it goes throughout the list. So, why would we think that a Christian would be or do anything less?

As I read through the gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, what strikes me is nowhere in Matthew, Mark, and Luke does Jesus say, "Believe in me"; but repeatedly, in all four of the gospels, he says, "Follow me." Only in John does Jesus say "Believe in me", and there he follows that up with, "Truly, truly, I say to you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do." [John 14:12]

So, the question now seems to be, "What is it to follow Jesus?" I am guessing that for each of us the answer will be a little different, for we are different people with different talents and abilities. However, some things we learn from Jesus should have a bearing on all of us. These are a few of the things I have gleaned from the scriptures:

Even though Jesus had his own ministry, he still kept coming to worship in the synagogues or the temple. I think Jesus valued the reading and studying of the scriptures. I think Jesus valued fellowship with other believers as they listened and were there for each other and challenged one another to see and do things.

Jesus takes God's calling (to the people of faith) to be a light to the nations seriously. He doesn't give of himself and his resources after everything else is taken care of. He makes it a priority, and he continues to grow.

- When Jesus has a disagreement with others of the people of faith he doesn't turn his back on them or disassociate with them. He continues engage with them. He risks (getting out and walking on the tightrope—so to speak). In the process he is honest and retains his integrity, but also extends God's grace and forgiveness even when others inside or outside of the faith don't "get it" or are hostile to it.
- Jesus was humble enough to know (in his human walk) that he didn't know it all. And, he was open to new insights as God, in his mysterious ways, presented them. (e.g. Jesus' encounter with the Syrophoenician woman [Mark 7:24-30, Matthew 15:21-28] after which Jesus seems to have opened himself more to ministry to people who were not Jews. Also, Jesus' heart-felt prayer in the garden of Gethsemane [Mark 14:32-42])


Examining ourselves and our faith and its practices can be a very scary thing, but it can also be incredibly enlightening. Lent is a season created by the Church to help us re-examine ourselves, our faith, and how we choose to practice our faith. This year the Lenten season begins, on March 6 (Ash Wednesday,) and continues through Easter, April 21. I invite you to take advantage of this season to explore who you are and what you are about in your Christian faith, and how God is at work in all of this. Ash Wednesday is the first day of the season of Lent. Ash Wednesday is one of the principal holy days for the Western Church. Most commonly observed by Catholics, Anglicans, Episcopalians, and Lutherans, Ash Wednesday falls on the seventh Wednesday before Easter (usually around February 9). Ash Wednesday begins a season of fasting and repentance (commonly known as *Lent*) in preparation for the <u>Easter</u> celebration.

How exactly the churches counted those 40 days varied depending on location. In the East, one only fasted on weekdays. The western church's Lent was one week shorter, but included Saturdays. But in both places, the observance was both strict and serious. Only one meal was taken a day, near the evening. There was to be no meat, fish, or animal products eaten.

The Origins of Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday's origins are tied to its history and the time of year during which it occurs. It follows the season of Epiphany, which culminates with Shrove <u>Tuesday</u>, which is also known as Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday). The solemn proceedings that occur on Ash Wednesday bring the focus back to the sacrifice of Christ and the mission of the Church. The observance most likely comes from the biblical Day of Atonement. In Leviticus 16, the Lord establishes an annual day of repentance for the Israelites as a lasting ordinance for all their generations. Since the blood of Jesus represents atonement, the heart of Ash Wednesday is a humbling of oneself through fasting and prayer.

On this day, Christians come before a priest to receive the sign of the cross, marked in ashes on their foreheads. Over the next month, they are encouraged to fast, pray, and seek repentance for their sins. Reflection upon one's life during the previous year receives extra attention, and a greater commitment to God and the Church is offered.

This ceremony originated around the eighth century and extends back to the custom during biblical times of people humbling themselves with sackcloth and ashes. The prophet Daniel speaks of seeking the Lord for the release of his people from Babylonian exile with fasting, sackcloth, and ashes (Daniel 9:3). Jonah 3:6 states: "When the news reached the king of Nineveh, he rose from his throne, took off his royal robes, covered himself with sackcloth and sat down in the dust."

Ash Wednesday Traditions

When studying Ash Wednesday history, ashes are often considered to be a symbol of man's mortality and represent an attitude of humility, sorrow, and repentance (Genesis 18:27). The ashes used in the Ash Wednesday ritual come from burning the palm branches used to celebrate <u>Palm Sunday</u> of the previous year. After being blessed with holy water, the ashes sit amidst burning incense to take on a pleasing scent. The priest or highest-ranking Church official administers them, first to the clergy and then to the laity.

In an old Ash Wednesday tradition, penitents who had committed grave sins would come wearing shifts made from rough cloth or animal hair. The priest would bless them and sprinkle ashes over them while they recited the Seven Penitential Psalms. The penitents would leave the church and for the next forty days strive for repentance and absolution. They would then return on Maundy Thursday and receive Communion from the priest.

One of the major tenets of the Christian faith is living one's life with humility and repentance. For many Christians, the origins of Ash Wednesday are the annual reminder of where our hearts should be in relation to God, and of the reason Jesus became our atonement.

She said, "Hi handsome. My name is Rose. I'm eightyseven years old. Can I give you a hug?"

I laughed and enthusiastically responded, "Of course you may!" and she gave me a giant squeeze. "Why are you in college at such a young, innocent age?" I asked. She jokingly replied, "I'm here to meet a rich husband, get married, have a couple of children,



and then retire and travel." "No seriously," I asked. I was curious what may have motivated her to be taking on this challenge at her age." I always dreamed of having a college education and now I'm getting one!" she told me.

After class we walked to the student union building and shared a chocolate milkshake. We became instant friends. Every day for the next three months we would leave class together and talk nonstop. I was always mesmerized listening to this "time machine" as she shared her wisdom and experience with me. Over the course of the year, Rose became a campus icon and she easily made friends wherever she went. She loved to dress up and she reveled in the attention bestowed upon her from the other students. She was living it up.

At the end of the semester we invited Rose to speak at our football banquet. I'll never forget what she taught us. She was introduced and stepped up to the podium. As she began to deliver her prepared speech, she dropped her three by five cards on the floor. Frustrated and a little embarrassed she leaned into the microphone and simply said, "I'm sorry I'm so jittery. I gave up beer for Lent and this whiskey is killing me! I'll never get my speech back in order so let me just tell you what I know."



As we laughed she cleared her throat and began: "We do not stop playing because we are old; we grow old because we stop playing. There are only four secrets to staying young, being happy, and achieving success." You have to laugh and find humor every day. "You've got to have a dream. When you lose your dreams, you die. We have so many people walking around who are dead and don't even



know it!" "There is a huge difference between growing older and growing up. If you are nineteen years old



and lie in bed for one full year and don't do one productive thing, you will turn twenty years old. If I am eighty-seven years old and stay in bed for a year and never do anything I will turn eighty-eight. Anybody can grow older. That doesn't take any talent or ability. The idea is to grow up by always finding the opportunity in change." "Have no regrets. The elderly usually don't have regrets for what we did, but rather for things we did not do. The only people who fear death are those with regrets. She concluded her speech by courageously singing "The Rose." She challenged each of us to study the lyrics and live them out in our daily lives.

At the years end Rose finished the college degree she had begun all those years ago. One week after graduation Rose died peacefully in her sleep. Over two thousand college students attended her funeral in

tribute to the wonderful woman who taught by example that it's never too late to be all you can possibly be. If you read this, please send this peaceful word of advice to your friends and family, they'll really enjoy it!

We send these words in loving memory of ROSE. Remember:

GROWING OLDER IS MANDATORY, GROWING UP IS OPTIONAL. Life is 10% what happens to me and 90% how I react to it. Each of us has the opportunity to change and grow until our very last breath. Happy creating.



Lent is the season of preparation for Easter. It starts on Ash Wednesday and ends on Easter, lasting for 40 days (not counting Sundays). We prepare for Easter by fasting and practicing spiritual discipline during this time – to reflect on His sacrifices. Young children have a hard time understanding Lent and 40 days can seem like forever.

Here is an activity for your children that will help them to appreciate the virtues

of Lent.

On Ash Wednesday, set out a glass jar for each child with a small copy of the

jellybean prayer taped to it. Determine a behavior to go with each jellybean color

(corresponding with the prayer). Each day the kids could earn a jellybean of any

color they followed through on.

They can't eat the jellybeans until Easter.

They cannot earn white jellybeans because these represent the Grace of Christ, which is a gift not earned ourselves. For more information copy or click the link below.

Blood of Christ - Each morning chose something to sacrifice that day to earn a red jellybean.



Palm's Shade - Each day for every good deed you can earn a green jelybean.



Gods Light - Earn a yellow jelybean when you share Gods light through kindness to others.



Prayers at Twilight-Orange jelybean for remembering your prayers before its bedtime.



Sweet Nights - Going to bed and waking up with a good attitude (blue or black)



Grace of Christ - You cannot earn.

His day of Sorrow - Earn for anytime you apologize to anyone we hurt with words or deeds that day.



New Tomorrow - Earned when we forgive those who apologized to us for hurtful behaviours.



The Power of Prayer: Skittles Experiment

This experiment with skittles is colourful, easy and makes a great statement about what we are asking God to do when we pray. In essence, prayers are a way of joining with God and asking him to have an effect on the world and situations around us. We pray because we believe that our prayers, through God's power, will make a difference to the world. In this activity, colour is released from the sweets into the surrounding water, creating a colorful picture, symbolic of how the prayers we raise to God are a way of us joining with Him to release the kingdom here on earth and have an impact.

You will need: A bag of skittles, a plate, hot water (not hot enough to scald, but hot enough to make the color run!)

Arrange the skittles in the plate

Pour some hot water onto the plate to cover its surface. Pour it carefully so that the skittles stay in place. Wait and the skittles will gradually release their color

Try an alternative...

Cover the surface of the plate with water and ask children to pick up a skittle, pray for a person or situation and place the skittle on the plate.
